1. Saint Joseph's Prep (6-1) St. Joseph's continued to impress by getting their 3rd shutout of the year in a 38-0 divisional win against Father Judge Saturday. The guys from the North side were beat but they weren't intimidated. In fact Judge's defense held the Hawks to their lowest rushing total, 167 yards, since Gilman, who held them to 92. Nice job Judge. But as we've seen, this Hawk has grown large, capable of scoring from all quarters. Quarterback Chris Whitney completed 8 of 15 for 143 yards and 3 touchdowns of 12, 27 and 33 yards. Receiver Bill Edger had a great game with 2 TD receptions and 5 catches for 93 yards. Tim Lutz caught Whitney's 33 yard TD strike. Since filling in for the injured John Shaw, Jamir Livingston has rushed for 361 yards in 4 games, 6.4 yards per carry. How's that for a sophomore. Tim Edger also contributed with a 33 yard field goal. And Dave Mendez had a fine game by returning a punt 75 yards for one score, and lugging an interception 28 yards for another. With a secondary like St. Joe's, the defensive front can just tee off on people. Judge was held to 50 yards rushing and 148 through the air. The win sets up a confrontation with 2nd place LaSalle Saturday. See # 11 LaSalle. (Hello to Christian H at SJP)

2. North Penn (7-0) Late score from Monday, North Penn beat Abington 28-7. The win sets up a SOL-National Conference confrontation at Neshaminy Friday night. Both are undefeated at 4-0 in conference play. See # 4 Neshaminy.

3. Cardinal O'Hara (6-1) Cardinal O'Hara had no difficulty with Archbishop Ryan Sunday winning easily 33-13. Ryan put some numbers on the board but they came in the 4th quarter when most of CO's starters were mere observers. The win keeps them deadlocked with St. Joe's at 4-0 in the Red Division. O'Hara has another Sunday game this week at home against Monsignor Bonner. Talk about a bad slump, Bonner won just 6 games from 2003 through this season, against 24 losses. This year they're 1-6. The offense has scored 40 points the entire season. And that's with a division one quarterback heading to Virginia?! The defense allows 22 a game. But against the big boys it's a sieve with 34-6, 33-0 and 34-0 losses to Upper Darby, Pennridge and St. Joseph's respectively. In defense of Bonner, that's quite a schedule. Still, it looks like O'Hara's starters will again be observers by the 4th quarter.

4. Neshaminy (6-1) Despite a rainy week creating horrible field conditions, Neshaminy won their 5th straight game of the year at the expense of Council Rock North, 24-6. The win keeps them atop the SOL-National Conference at 4-0. Quarterback Andrew Flogel had one of his better outings of the season by completing 7 of 9 passes for 164 yards. And it was a balanced attack. The Skins had 315 total yards to CR North's 149. Coach Schmidt and staff have the Redskins playing like a title contender. They're scoring 36 a game on average while allowing just 11. Those are season stats, including the opening loss to St. Joe's, 28-14. The Hawks scored 37 % of all points scored against Neshaminy

this season. Eliminating those points shows the Skins at 40 points per game average, supported by a defense allowing 8 ppg. Looking at their opponent Friday, North Penn, shows a team averaging 34 ppg and allowing 16. Because they played a similar schedule, you can do what we did with Neshaminy and eliminate their toughest opponent, O'Hara, to get another view showing the Knights scoring 34 ppg and allowing 14. That's simplistic but revealing since at the end of the day it's about points scored and allowed, not yardage. Penalties, weather, coaching, injuries, turnovers, field position, etc, etc, all wind up on the scoreboard, or not. Points For and Points Against can tell you a great deal about a team. Friday's game brings two rich traditions together. The Knight's have responded to key graduation losses, while Neshaminy seems well recovered from an opening day 28-14 loss to St. Joe's. Remember, the Skins came back in that one from a 14-0 half time deficit to play the Hawk's on even terms the 2nd half, 14-14. And there are not many teams with a running back like John Shaw to get you 138 yards rushing on 22 carries. Like last week's Strath Haven-Upper Darby write up, this one has to be a toss up, with a *lean* to Neshaminy. They split last year with the Knights winning at home in the regular season 31-30, and Neshaminy winning at home in the post season, 51-34.

5. Conestoga (7-0) Conestoga remained undefeated atop the Central League by defeating Radnor 33-6. As always, Radnor was stubborn, getting 14 first downs and 173 yards on the ground. But the rain and some big hits caused 7 Raider fumbles. 5 were recovered by Stoga. 3 were converted to touchdowns. And that's what you look for playing in steady rain, some turnovers and scores from the defense. Stoga got the fumbles, returning one 47 yards in the 2nd quarter to blow the thing open at 20-0. Their field is the plastic stuff, but you still look for all the help you can get from the D on a rainy night. Not that the offense needed it with quarterback Brian Ikeda completing 6 of 8 (1 interception) for 135 yards, and a stable of backs getting another 153 on the ground. What stands between Conestoga and a perfect regular season are games at Springfield, Haverford and Marple-Newtown. And with North Penn-Neshaminy battling Friday, Stoga will get a very high seed in the postseason. Wouldn't a rematch with Upper Darby be special! They're at Springfield Saturday where the Cougars are coming off their 1st win since the opener. Last year's 5-5 team gave the Pioneers fits, but lost 35-27.

6. Malvern Prep (6-0) Now this is what you call a turnaround! Malvern Prep has risen from the ashes of last year's forgettable 3-7 season, to great heights this season where they are just stuffing people. Last week's victim was fellow Inter-AC member Haverford School, going down hard in a 42-0 shutout. That one came on the heels of an impressive rout of one of Delaware's finest, Salesianum, 48-21. Even powerful William Penn, Delaware's # 2 ranked team couldn't do that in their 25-6 win against the Sals. Most impressive was the road win at Henderson (4-3) 28-27, then home the following week where they defeated 7th ranked Downingtown East 23-20. Nice. Looking ahead it's hard seeing a blip on the scope unless it's undefeated Valley Forge Military Academy (5-0) November 12th. Some familiar teams they defeated are Roman 14-6, Brooklyn's Poly Prep, 31-14 and Penn Charter, 26-0. One of the Inter-AC teams will have to step up big to bring down this year's Prep team.

7. Downingtown East (6-1) Downingtown East took sole ownership of 1st place in the Ches-Mont by defeating Coatesville 34-20 in Coatesville. Quarterback Pat Devlin had a solid evening completing 18 of 25 passes for 300 yards and 3 touchdowns. He rushed for another touchdown while gaining 39 yards on 13 carries. The big Cougar attack generated 413 yards of total offense and 20 first downs. East and the rain held C.J. Gray to a sub-par 89 yards rushing. Coatesville's big gun was unheralded quarterback Scott A'Hara who threw for 238 yards. He throws bullets. But Devlin has acrobatic receivers like Justin Blye and running back Richie Walls who catch anything thrown their way. East seems to be a power back away from being special stuff. Before last week's games, they held the 5th seed for postseason concerns. That won't be threatened Friday unless AAA Bishop Shanahan (1-5) morphs into something yet unseen this year. East won last year 49-7.

8. Upper Darby (6-1) Upper Darby came into the Monday night game at Strath Haven as advertised; big, quick and talented. But this was Strath Haven's turf, so they'd have to go the extra mile to get past the Panther's, and go the extra mile they did. Both teams slugged it out for 4 quarters of really well played football. Each side was penalized a mere 3 times. The refs allowed them to play a well fought clean game. Well, mostly clean. No interceptions were thrown. Each side lost but one fumble, so for the most part it was pure football between two evenly matched teams. It was a game where you felt the team that didn't make an untimely error, penalty or turnover, and had the ball last would probably win. Oddly, the team that had the ball last lost. This one was even for most of the evening, with the two deadlocked at the half 6-6. Jared Bradley's 26 yard run opened the scoring in the 1st quarter for Strath Haven, followed by Simoni Marco Lawrence's 2nd quarter 7 yard run for UD. Both extra point attempts failed. The 2nd half opened with S.M. Lawrence slipping to his knee after fielding the kickoff at the 1 foot line. Then Upper Darby showed their stuff by launching a clock eating 99 yard drive with Lawrence going over from the 8 for a 13-6 lead with 7 to go in the 3rd. What a drive! UD seemed infused with confidence after that. But this is Strath Haven, they're used to taking a body blow, and delivering one of their own. 5 minutes later they did just that with Kevin Kaminski going 15 for the score at the 2:00 mark of the 3rd. At 6-2, 192 lbs, with surprising speed and balance, Kaminski is quite a load and compliment to the more heralded Jared Bradley. The 4th quarter opened with S.M Lawrence getting his 3rd TD of the night at the 10:29 mark of the 4th quarter. And that's where it looked like it would stay. But Haven had one more drive in them. Quarterback Mike Wray hit Roy-Al Edwards who out fought and out leaped 2 Upper Darby defenders in the left corner of the end zone to snag a 22 yard strike. It had to be a perfect throw and it was, with 1:16 to go in the 4th quarter. The extra point tied it up at 20-20. Darby ran the clock out to force the overtime. Haven won the flip, deferred, and UD scored as QB Blaine Fox (2/3/0/76) hit Brandon Murray on the first play. The extra point was good, giving the Royal's a 27-20 lead. Haven got the ball and scored on a 4th and goal at the 1, making it 27-26. And that's where it stayed with Strath Haven's extra point attempt going wide right. All of us that were fortunate enough to see that one were treated to a classic we'll talk about forever. It was memorable, and it kept the Royals in the thick of it for the post season playoffs. To remain there they need a win at home against Penncrest Friday, followed by a difficult

game at Ridley the 28th. If they can do that, beat Ridley on the road, then take Penn Wood at home the following week, they're in.

9. West Catholic (6-1) West Catholic beat Kennedy Kenrick last Sunday 19-6. The score doesn't look to impressive but the stats sure were. West rushed for 233 yards. Their incredible tailback Dennis Shaw rushed for 166 yards on 29 carries. For the year he's rushed for 816 yards, an 8.2 yards per carry clip. They got another 82 yards through the air. Defensively the Burr's were brutal, holding the Wolverines to minus 12 yards rushing and 58 yards total for the game. Wow, West is really beating up on people. Except for the O'Hara game, they've held the other 6 opponents to 12 total points. O'Hara scored 14, so counting all games we're talking about a special defense that's allowed just 3.7 points per game. That smacks of a lot of athleticism, speed and discipline. Neumann-Goretti is up next on Saturday. After a 2-0 start, the Saints lost 4 of 5 to enter this one 3-4. West dominated them last year 37-0 and could duplicate that score here.

10. Strath Haven (5-2, 3A) Coach forgot more football than I ever learned but 15 pass attempts is wild stuff for a Clancy coached football team. That's not the reason they lost but it did provide for some interesting conversation in the stands. Strath Haven lost their second overtime game of the year against a powerful AAAA team headed for the playoffs. The Panther's are a fine AAA team. Hopefully they'll get to the playoffs to demonstrate that. They'll go 8-2 again this year by running out against Lower Merion, Springfield and Penncrest. With others above them sure to lose, they are NOT out of the AAA playoff picture. Lower Merion's up next in Ardmore Saturday. Haven won last year 41-7 and could do the same this year if there's anything left after the Monday night brawl with Upper Darby. Here are some stats from the Upper Darby game: Strath Haven had 14 first downs, 195 yards rushing on 44 attempts, 90 yards passing at 6/15/0, 1 lost fumble, 3 penalties for 35 yards. Jared Bradley had a big night, getting 130 yards on 25 carries. Kevin Kaminski had 13 carries for 57 yards. Upper Darby had 11 first downs, 206 yards rushing on 53 attempts, 76 yards passing at 2/3/0, 4 fumbles 1 lost, 3 penalties for 21 yards. Simoni Marco Lawrence was the bomb again, getting 172 yards on 37 carries!

11. LaSalle (6-1) When viewing stats in the Red Division showing a team held to 2 first downs, minus 19 yards rushing and 31 yards of total offense, you just assume the heavy is either St. Joe's or O'Hara. Typically, that'd be a pretty good guess. But the perpetrator this week was LaSalle, whose shutdown of Bonner was near total, except for those 31 yards, in a resounding 15-0 win. The Explorer's also did a good job of shutting themselves down with 3 fumbles, an interception and 5 penalties for 50 yards. Not to be outdone, Bonner fumbled 2 times, threw 3 interceptions and had 7 penalties for 70 yards to make this one of the least attractive games of the year to watch. At 3-1 the Explorer's are tied with Roman for 2nd in the Red. They're having a great season, scoring a lot of points, 28 a game, and playing some good defense at 9 ppg. In their only game against an exceptional team, Cardinal O'Hara, they were held to 3 first downs, 9 yards rushing and 40 yards of total offense in a 14-0 loss. O'Hara's inconsistent offense generated 13 first downs, 210 yards rushing and 310 yards of total O. That doesn't bode well with a road opponent like St. Joe's up next. Knowing the Hawks' went 2 for 3 against Neshaminy, St. Ignatius and Gilman, tells you LaSalle is in for a hard time of it here.

12. Ridley (5-2) The air power that is Ridley needed two 4th quarter air strikes at Haverford to pull out a hard fought 21-7 win against the fighting Fords. Touchdown strikes of 5 and 29 yards to Dino Vasso sealed the event. For the night, Ridley's quarterback Al Humes completed 15 of 21 throws for 225 yards without an interception. You don't see a 71% completion rate to often. The Green Raider's rushed for another 98 yards on 38 carries. Haverford completed 7 of 21 attempts for 113 yards, with 9 more yards coming on the ground on 21 carries. 9 yards! Ridley's at dangerous Marple-Newtown (4-3) Friday. Marple's won 3 of the last 4, and 2 of 3 road games including last week at Penncrest, 28-13. Before last week's games, Ridley held the 17th seed in District One for the postseason playoff. Many teams above them lost, including 7th seeded Academy Park, 8th seeded Coatesville, 9th seeded Abington, 11th seeded Council Rock North, Truman and Quakertown seeded 12th and 13th respectively, and 16th seeded Haverford. 18th seeded Spring-Ford also lost. Last week's winners were top seeded North Penn, 2nd seeded Conestoga, 3rd seeded Pennsbury, 4th seeded Neshaminy, 5th seeded Downingtown East, 6th seeded Central Bucks East, 10th seeded Upper Darby, 14th seeded Tennett and 15th seeded Plymouth Whitemarsh. So the deck got reshuffled. And with a lot of football left to play, the Raider's are still alive.

13. Pennsbury (6-1) Pennsbury throttled Bensalem last week 39-9 to go 3-1 in the National. That's good enough for 2nd place. They're scoring 28 points a game and allowing 15. Excluding the loss to North Penn, they're at 31 a game and allowing 12. This is a good football team. Not great one, but a solid one that owns an impressive 3-0 won-loss on the road. 2 of their last 3 games are at home, beginning Saturday against Pennridge. There'll be some extra incentive for this one knowing the Rams routed them last year 40-19. Things have changed since then! Pennridge doesn't have you know who in the backfield, and they are not as they were last year at this time, 6-1, scoring 32 ppg on the way to the postseason and a 10-3 record. At this same time last year, Pennsbury was a hopeful 5 and 2. Then came the blowout to Pennridge, and the disappointment of a 0-3 finish. Pennridge got a road win last week and it's probably asking too much to expect another one here. The Falcons are playing with a purpose and real shot at the playoffs. They need this one (pressure?) with a road date at Abington the 28th preceding a homer against Neshaminy.

14. Coatesville (5-2) Coatesville plummeted in the rankings after a disappointing 14 point league loss *at home* in a must-win playoff like setting. Hopes of repeating as Ches-Mont champs received a severe blow with the 34-20 loss to Downingtown East. The only good news is that running back C.J. Gray went over 5000 career rushing yards during the game. Because C.J. is a class act, that's probably not good news at all. More importantly, their post season playoff hopes took a major hit as well. The Red Raider's were ranked 8th in last week's AAAA playoff picture. Things were looking especially good with Interboro beating the 7 seed Academy Park Friday 16-13 in overtime. But Downingtown East has their eyes on the postseason prize to, and the Raider's went down. Because Dtown East has a road match with revitalized Henderson November 14th, there is still a viable race in the Ches-Mont. Coatesville gets Henderson October 28th, then finish with Dtown West. This week they're on the road at West Chester East. East is hurting this

year. A lot of youth equals a lot of losses, and that's where they are at 2-4. The Raider's struggled with them last year, eking out a 7-6 win at home. Coatesville still has a chance at the playoffs with a number of big games on the horizon for teams currently ahead of them in the race to the Great 8.

15. Pottsgrove (5-1, 3A) For any shot at the postseason, Pottsgrove has to win out. They've probably had to win out since the top of the season. And they've played like that for most of the schedule excepting the slip-up in game 3 against Boyertown. Since then they're 3-0, averaging 35 a game while allowing 9. In all games played, they've scored 204 points for a 34 points per game average. The D is there at 46 total points for a 8 ppg yield. Only Lansdale Catholic and Boyertown have dented them for more at 14 each, and they beat LC. This is a nice team with good size and a fine back in Brent Carter. It seems how Brent goes, so go the Falcon's but they are well supported this year with good defense. The latest victim, Pottstown, was shutout Friday 41-0. Owen J. Roberts is up next, away. About the AAA playoffs: Before last week's games, the seeds from 1 through 8 were as follow; Chichester, Bok (D-12, Philly), Strath Haven, Unionville, Franklin (D-12), Phoenixville, Pottsgrove and Interboro. That will change dramatically with Chichester losing to Salesianum 35-20. That was a big test for Chi, taking on a well coached, tradition steeped team like Salesianum. The Sals at 4-2 are Delaware's 3rd rated team. All other teams in the listings won, except for Strath Haven who fell to Upper Darby in overtime, 27-26.

16. Central Bucks East (6-1) Before getting enamored with Central Bucks East, we should remember they lost to the only SOL National team played this season, Council Rock North, 28-10 in the 2nd game of the year. To date that's the toughest team played. But you can't hold one loss against a team the entire season. The wins came against SOL-Continental, American Conference and D-12 opposition from Philly. But the same thoughts about schedule quality were thrown around last year regarding Central Bucks West who narrowly lost in the final moment of the playoffs to Neshaminy, 38-34, so no disrespect meant. With that said, all the wins were impressive ones where they completely neutralized the other team. Since CRN, no one has scored more than 7 points against them. Counting the loss, they've allowed 6 ppg. Excluding it drops the yield to 3 ppg! So the D has made life miserable for everyone else. From here on out the schedule appears to be one the Patriots can run, although the game at Tennett October 28th is key. So there are pitfalls, including Friday at home against Central Bucks South. The Titans gave them a game last year, losing 21-14 at home. This year's edition seems capable, but they're not getting it done. They're 1-6 on a 5 game losing streak. The offense is inconsistent at 14 points per game with an unsupportive defense allowing 30. Still, it's a Central Bucks team so East needs to bring it. They held the 6th seed prior to last week's games and need the next 3 against CBS, Tennett and Council Rock South to lock up a berth in the playoffs.

17. Pennridge (4-3) The Rams showed a pulse, albeit a weak one, by winning a tough one at Truman, 21-14. They finally beat a +.500 team on the road. Well done! The other road games ended in disaster at Central Dauphin and North Penn. Things are looking bleak for the playoffs, but as mentioned last week, they can still have a fine season by

winning out to go 9-3. It's a difficult start with the road game at Pennsbury Saturday but it's doable. After that comes a homer against Council Rock North, followed by away games at Bensalem and Cheltenham. The Thanksgiving week game as always is Quakertown. Don't the Rams want to butt some heads after last year's 21-7 loss to the Panther's. At 4-3 the Rams assume the role of spoiler against Pennsbury. Pennridge swamped Pennsbury last year 40-19. The year before was by the same 21 point margin, 28-7, so they've owned them recently.

18. Lansdale Catholic (6-1, 2A) Lansdale Catholic dropped in the rankings following the poor performance against Upper Perkiomen. They barely won, 6-0. In the last 2 games they've allowed Perkiomen Valley 21 points in a 34-21 win, and narrowly escaped Upper Perkiomen. Upper Perk and Perk Val are having average seasons at 2-4 and 3-4 respectively. The playoff picture: District One's and District's Eleven's AA teams are merged in a Sub-Regional like District One's and District Twelve's AAA teams. The AA playoff picture entering last week's games had Northern Lehigh on top, followed by Pine Grove and LC. Saucon Valley, Catasauqua, Palisades and Wilson Boro, not Wilson West Lawn as shown in papers, held 5 through 7 respectively. The Crusader's didn't get any help with Northern Lehigh and Pine Grove winning to stay unbeaten at 7-0. Palisades and Wilson got good news with higher seeded Saucon Valley and Catasauqua losing. This week's match up will affect both AA and AAA classes with Phoenixville's undefeated Phantoms visiting Lansdale Friday night. LC's recent performances combined with Phoenixville's steady play and last week's 41-0 drubbing of Perkiomen Valley suggest a tight one here. A Phantom win would not surprise. We wouldn't have said that a month ago following the Phantoms' 13-6 win at Upper Perkiomen. Since then, they've outscored Pottstown, Owen J. Roberts and Perkiomen Valley by a combined point total of 124 to 29. The game with LC represents the Phantoms 5th road trip in the last 7 games, so it won't be easy.

19. Archbishop Wood (5-2) Archbishop Wood seems well recovered from the season opening 26-0 loss to Cardinal O'Hara in Ocean City, and subsequent loss to Joe Zeglinski's led Archbishop Ryan team in the 3rd game of the year. Quick digression; before the injury Zeglinski rushed for 630 yards on 84 carries in 4 games! That's 7.5 yards per carry and the reason Wood has 2 losses this year. Joe tore them up for 34 % of his 4 game total by rushing for 217 yards in the Raider's 28-26 win. Since he went down, Ryan is 0-3 after a 2-2 start. Back to the present; Wood is on a 4 game winning streak since losing to Ryan, hot on the trail of a 3peat in the Blue Division. West Catholic will have something to say about that. They've met in the finals two consecutive years and will likely meet again this year. Wood's 11-0 team edged West's 7-6 bunch in the 2003 final 17-14. West stepped up big in that one. Last year saw a reversal, with the Raider's 8-4 edition stunning West's 11-2 team in the final, 29-0. In 2002 West lost to Carroll. In 2001, Wood lost to Carroll. Carroll had that awesome 4 year run (99-02) where they won 3 Blue titles and 45 out of 52 games. But recently, the Blue has been about Wood and West. This year's team is chugging along at the same numbers as the '03 edition by generating 23 points per game. The D mirrors the '04 unit yielding 13 ppg. With Conwell Egan up next followed by Dougherty, they should be 7-2 awaiting West Catholic. The Burr's will be 8-1 if they avoid a stumble at Carroll. To date, both are undefeated in Blue

play at 4-0. And the schedule makers got it right this time by allowing Wood and West to end the regular season against each other in what should be a climatic finish in the Blue Division. Don't you love it!

20. Tennett (5-2) At the top of the season we mentioned something to the effect of there being a lot of turbulence among these lower 10 teams. Over the course of the last 7 weeks, 25 different teams have come and gone. Some stayed, like Central Bucks East, Pottsgrove and Lansdale Catholic, but mostly these teams reflected the balance, parity, number of average teams in the area, or whatever your particular opinion suggests. It does seem no team wants to be here. These guys, the defending SOL-Continental champs were here back in the 5th week of the season sporting a 4-1 record. They were routed at Downingtown East in the 2nd week of the season but recovered to win their next 3 games. 2 of the 5 wins were road wins by real margins, 35-7 at Cheltenham and 42-21 at Council Rock South. So they advanced in the polls as high as 14th following a 21-3 shutdown of Norristown. The following week saw Quakertown's inconsistent but capable team in for a game. At the time, they were 2-3 with back-to-back *home losses* to Wissahickon and Upper Merion. So it came as some surprise when they beat Tennett 19-16 in overtime. That brings us to this week's game at Hatboro Horsham. If Hatboro has any memory of last year's game, Tennett will need to take special care in this one. Showing no respect for Tennett's homecoming last year, Hatboro jumped all over William to the tune of 20 first quarter points. The nerve! WT got none. This was a critical game for both with a conference title and postseason playoff berth hanging in the balance. Tennett entered the game at 5-2. Hatboro was 6-1. In the 2nd quarter the Panther's awoke from their lethargy to score 14. But the Hatter's got another 6 to lead at halftime 26-14. Behind senior quarterback Justin Kull throwing for 173 yards and senior Brandon Pirrone's 129 yards on the ground (let's hear it for senior leadership), the Panther's clawed their way back with two 2nd half scores to pull out a shaky but exciting 27-26 homecoming win. What a game. This one could be just as tight.

Honorable Mention
